PPACA: GRANT OPPORTUNITIES OF INTEREST TO HOSPITALS

AT A GLANCE

In late March, President Obama enacted the *Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act of 2010 (PPACA)*. This historic legislation constitutes the largest change to America's health care system since the creation of the Medicare and Medicaid programs. Among other provisions, the \$940 billion legislation expands health insurance coverage to 32 million individuals, takes steps to reduce the rate of increase in Medicare and Medicaid spending, and adopts several key delivery system reforms. The law also contains a number of grants and contract opportunities for states, hospitals and other health care entities.

The attached document, prepared for the AHA by Hogan Lovells, L.L.P., describes many of the funding opportunities that may be available to hospitals. These opportunities are organized into five categories:

- Grants, contracts and credits to hospitals and other health care entities;
- Opportunities to contract with states or the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS);
- Demonstration projects and payment changes;
- Loan repayment programs, scholarships and fellowships; and
- Grants to states and local governments.

For each available opportunity, the document includes the name of the program, a description of the program, the section of the PPACA and other statutory references, eligibility criteria, the funding source and amount, and the application process, if specified.

I. Grants, Contracts and Credits to Hospitals and Other Health Care Providers

Section of PPACA	Title I, Subtitle D, Part II Consumer Choices and Insurance Competition Through Health Insurance Exchanges
1311(i)	<p>Program: Navigators</p> <p>Description: Grants to entities to serve as a navigator for individuals served by state Exchanges to: conduct public education activities to raise awareness of the availability of qualified health plans; distribute fair and impartial information concerning enrollment in qualified health plans and the availability of premium tax credits and cost-sharing reductions; facilitate enrollment in qualified health plans; provide referrals to any applicable office of health insurance consumer assistance or health insurance ombudsman or any other appropriate state agency or agencies for any enrollee with a grievance, complaint, or question regarding their health plan, coverage, or a determination under such plan or coverage; and provide information in a manner that is culturally and linguistically appropriate to the needs of the population being served.</p> <p>Eligibility: An entity that can demonstrate either existing relationships, or that the entity could readily establish relationships, with: employers and employees, consumers, or self-employed individuals likely to be qualified to enroll in a qualified health plan. These entities may include: trade, industry and professional associations; commercial fishing industry organizations; ranching and farming organizations; community and consumer-focused nonprofit groups; chambers of commerce; unions; resource partners of the Small Business Administration; other licensed insurance agents and brokers and other qualified entities.</p> <p>Funding Source: State Exchanges. Funding must be provided from the operational funds of the state Exchange and not from federal funds received by the state to establish the Exchange.</p> <p>Funding Amount: Not specified.</p> <p>Application Process: Not specified. Administered by each state Exchange.</p>

Section of PPACA	Title I, Subtitle E, Part II Small Business Tax Credit
1421	<p>Program: Credit for Employee Health Insurance Expenses of Small Businesses</p> <p>Description: Beginning in 2010, provides a sliding scale tax credit to small employers that purchase health insurance for their employees. This credit is also made available to those employers who are tax exempt under section 501(c).</p> <p>Eligibility: Beginning in 2010, employers with fewer than 25 employees and average annual wages of less than \$50,000 that contribute at least 50 percent of the total premium cost or 50 percent of a benchmark premium.</p> <p>Funding Source: Internal Revenue Service.</p> <p>Funding Amount: From 2010 through 2013, eligible employers can receive a small business tax credit for up to 35 percent of their contribution toward the employee’s health insurance premium and those tax-exempt eligible employers are eligible for tax credits of up to 25 percent of their contribution. Beginning in 2014, eligible employers who purchase coverage through the state Exchange can receive a tax credit for two years of up to 50 percent of their contribution and tax-exempt eligible employers are eligible for tax credits of up to 35 percent of their contribution.</p> <p>Application Process: The credit is to be part of the general business credit.</p> <p>Statutory Reference: Subpart D of part IV of subchapter A of chapter 1 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986.</p>

2951	<p>Program: Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visitation Programs</p> <p>Description: Grants to deliver services under early childhood home visitation programs to eligible families in order to promote: improvements in prenatal, infant, child, and maternal health and development; parenting related to child development outcomes, school readiness and the socioeconomic status of such families; and reductions in child abuse, neglect, and injuries.</p> <p>Eligibility: States, Puerto Rico, Guam, the Virgin Islands, the Northern Mariana Islands, American Samoa, Indian Tribes, Tribal Organizations, or Urban Indian Organizations. 3013	<p>Program: Quality Measure Development</p> <p>Description: Grants, contracts, or intergovernmental agreements to eligible entities to develop, improve, update, or expand quality measures for use in federal health programs.</p> <p>Eligibility: Entities that: have demonstrated expertise in the development and evaluation of quality measures; have adopted procedures to include the views of various stakeholders in the quality measure development process; collaborate with the National Quality Forum and the Secretary; have transparent policies regarding governance and conflicts of interest; and submit an application.</p> <p>Funding Source: Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality of the Department of Health and Human Services.</p> <p>Funding Amount: Appropriates \$375 million (\$75 million for each of fiscal years 2010 through 2014) to accomplish this and related quality measure development under section 1890A of the Social Security Act.</p> <p>Application Process: Submit an application at such time and in such manner as the Secretary of Health and Human Services may require.</p> <p>Statutory Reference: Title IX of the Public Health Service Act (42 U.S.C. § 299 et seq.).</p>

<p>3501 (funding under 3511)</p>	<p>Program: Quality Improvement Technical Assistance Award</p> <p>Description: Technical assistance grants or contracts to provide technical support to institutions that deliver health care and health care providers so that such institutions and providers understand, adapt, and implement the models developed by the Center for Quality Improvement and Patient Safety of the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality.</p> <p>Eligibility: Health care provider, health care provider association, professional society, health care worker organization, Indian health organization, quality improvement organization, patient safety organization, local quality improvement collaborative, the Joint Commission, academic health center, university, physician-based research network, primary care extension program, a federal Indian Health Service program, a health program operated by an Indian tribe, or any other entity identified by the Secretary of Health and Human Services. Must also have demonstrated expertise in providing information and technical support and assistance to health care provider regarding quality improvement.</p> <p>Funding Source: Center for Quality Improvement and Patient Safety of the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality of the Department of Health and Human Services.</p> <p>Funding Amount: There is authorized to be appropriated such funds as may be necessary. Participating entities must also provide matching funds.</p> <p>Application Process: Submit an application containing a plan for a sustainable business model and such other information as the Director of the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality may require.</p> <p>Statutory Reference: Part D of title IX of the Public Health Service Act.</p>
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<p>3501 (funding under 3511)</p>	<p>Program: Quality Improvement Implementation Award</p> <p>Description: Implementation grants to eligible entities to implement the models developed by the Center for Quality Improvement and Patient Safety of the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality.</p> <p>Eligibility: May be a hospital or other health care provider or consortium of providers, as determined by the Secretary of Health and Human Services. Must also have demonstrated expertise in providing information and technical support and assistance to health care providers regarding quality improvement.</p> <p>Funding Source: Center for Quality Improvement and Patient Safety of the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality of the Department of Health and Human Services.</p> <p>Funding Amount: There is authorized to be appropriated such funds as may be necessary. Provides that the Secretary may also award grants under section 931 of the Public Health Service Act to develop performance measures to assess the effectiveness of these programs.</p> <p>Eligibility: Entities that provide a setting appropriate for MTM services.</p> <p>Funding Source: Department of Health and Human Services.</p> <p>Funding Amount: There is authorized to be appropriated such funds as may be necessary.</p> <p>Application Process: Submit a plan for achieving long-term financial sustainability; where applicable, submit a plan for coordinating MTM services through local community health teams or in collaboration with primary care extension programs; submit a plan for providing MTM services in accordance with the statutory requirements; and submit any other information that the Secretary of Health and Human Services may require.</p> <p>Statutory Reference: Title IX of the Public Health Service Act (42 U.S.C. § 299 et seq.).</p>

3505(a)	<p>Program: Trauma Care Centers and Service Availability</p> <p>Description: The Secretary of Health and Human Services shall establish three programs to award grants to: (1) assist in defraying substantial uncompensated care costs; (2) further the core missions of such trauma centers, including by addressing costs associated with patient stabilization and transfer, trauma education and outreach, coordination with local and regional trauma systems, essential personnel and other fixed costs, and expenses associated with employee and non-employee physician services; and (3) provide emergency relief to ensure the continued and future availability of trauma services. Grants are made for a period of three fiscal years, which may be extended for one additional year.</p> <p>Eligibility: Qualified public, nonprofit Indian Health Service, Indian tribal, and urban Indian trauma centers that participate in trauma systems that are compliant with certain, specified requirements (unless located in a state that does not operate a trauma care system). Such trauma centers must also be verified by the American College of Surgeons or designated by an equivalent State or local agency.</p> <p><i>Substantial Uncompensated Care Cost Awards:</i> Recipients of uncompensated care grants must fall into one of three categories of uncompensated care or qualify for funds under a Low Income Pool or Safety Net Care Pool established through a section 1115 waiver. To be eligible, a trauma center must also submit a plan that demonstrates a continued commitment to serving trauma patients regardless of their ability to pay and have policies in place to assist patients who cannot pay for the care they receive.</p> <p><i>Emergency Awards:</i> Trauma centers will be given preference for emergency award grants if they provide trauma care in an area in which the availability of trauma care has significantly decreased or will significantly decrease if the center is forced to close or downgrade its service.</p> <p>Funding Source: Department of Health and Human Services.</p> <p>Funding Amount: There are authorized to be appropriated \$100 million for fiscal year 2009, and such sums as may be necessary for each of fiscal years 2010 through 2015. 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3505(b)	<p>Program: Trauma Service Availability Grants to States</p> <p>Description: Funding to states to award grants to: reduce shortages of certain trauma-related specialties; provide for individual safety net trauma center fiscal stability; reduce trauma center overcrowding; establish new trauma centers; enhance collaboration between trauma centers and other hospitals; make capital improvements to enhance access and expedite trauma care; enhance trauma surge capacity; ensure expedient receipt of transported trauma patients; and enhance interstate trauma center collaboration.</p> <p>Eligibility: Public or nonprofit trauma centers or consortia thereof; safety net public or nonprofit trauma centers; or hospitals in an underserved area that seek to establish new trauma services.</p> <p>Funding Source: Department of Health and Human Services.</p> <p>Funding Amount: Appropriates \$600 million (\$100 million for each of fiscal years 2010 through 2015).</p> <p>Application Process: Submit an application to the state at such time, in such manner, and containing such information as the state may require.</p> <p>Statutory Reference: Title XII of the Public Health Service Act (42 U.S.C. § 300d et seq.)</p>
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3506	<p>Program: Program to Develop and Update Patient Decision Aids to Assist Health Care Providers and Patients and Grants to Support Shared Decisionmaking Implementation</p> <p>Description: Grants and contracts to develop, update and produce patient decision aids for preference sensitive care to assist health care providers in educating patients, caregivers, and authorized representatives concerning the relative safety, effectiveness, and cost of treatment and to test such materials to ensure they are balanced, evidence-based, and applicable to a broad array of practice settings. Also provides grants for the establishment and support of Shared Decisionmaking Resource Centers to provide technical assistance to providers and to develop and disseminate best practices and other information to support and accelerate adoption, implementation, and effective use of patient decision aids and shared decisionmaking by providers.</p> <p>Eligibility: Not specified.</p> <p>Funding Source: Department of Health and Human Services.</p> <p>Funding Amount: Authorizes an appropriation of such funding as may be necessary for fiscal year 2010 and each subsequent fiscal year.</p> <p>Application Process: Not specified.</p> <p>Statutory Reference: Part D of title IX of the Public Health Service Act.</p>
3508 (funding under 3511)	<p>Program: Demonstration Program to Integrate Quality Improvement and Patient Safety Training Into Clinical Education of Health Professionals</p> <p>Description: Grants to carry out demonstration projects to develop and implement academic curricula that integrate quality improvement and patient safety in the clinical education of health professionals.</p> <p>Eligibility: Entities or consortia that include: a health professions school; a school of public health; a school of social work; a school of nursing; a school of pharmacy; an institution with a graduate medical education program; or a school of health care administration. Such entities must also collaborate in the development of curricula with their accrediting organization and provide for the collection of data regarding the demonstration project.</p> <p>Funding Source: Department of Health and Human Services.</p> <p>Funding Amount: There is authorized to be appropriated such funds as may be necessary. Grantees must also provide matching funds.</p> <p>Application Process: Submit an application at such time, in such manner, and containing such information as the Secretary of Health and Human Services may require.</p>

3510	<p>Program: Patient Navigator Program</p> <p>Description: Imposes additional limitations on the existing Patient Navigator Program under section 340A of the Public Health Service Act by requiring that grantees meet certain minimum core proficiencies.</p> <p>Eligibility: Public or nonprofit private health center (including a federally qualified health center), health facility operated by or pursuant to a contract with the Indian Health Service, a hospital, a cancer center, a rural health clinic, an academic health center, or a nonprofit entity that enters into a partnership or coordinates referrals with such a center, clinic, facility, or hospital to provide patient navigator services.</p> <p>Funding Source: Health Resources and Services Administration of the Department of Health and Human Services.</p> <p>Funding Amount: In addition to the \$3.5 million that was already appropriated for 2010, appropriates “such sums as may be necessary for each of fiscal years 2011 through 2015.”</p> <p>Application Process: Existing. Submit an application in such form, in such manner, and containing such information as the Secretary of Health and Human Services may require. At a minimum, the Secretary shall require each such application to outline how the eligible entity will establish baseline measures and benchmarks that meet the Secretary’s requirements to evaluate program outcomes.</p> <p>Statutory Reference: Section 340A of the Public Health Service Act (42 U.S.C. § 256a).</p>
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Section of PPACA	Title IV, Subtitle B Increasing Access to Clinical Preventive Services
4101(a)	<p>Program: Grants for the Establishment of School-Based Health Centers</p> <p>Description: Grants to support the operation of school-based health centers to be spent on: facilities, equipment, or similar expenditures.</p> <p>Eligibility: School-based health center, meaning a clinic that is located in or near a school facility of a school district or board or of an Indian tribe or tribal organization; is organized through school, community, and health provider relationships; is administered by a sponsoring facility; provides through health professionals primary health services to children in accordance with state and local law, including laws relating to licensure and certification; and satisfies such other requirements as a state may establish for the operation of such a clinic. Eligible entities may include a sponsoring facility, which may be any of the following: a hospital; a public health department; a community health center; a nonprofit health care agency; a school or school system; a program administered by the Indian Health Service or the Bureau of Indian Affairs or operated by an Indian tribe or a tribal organization.</p> <p>Funding Source: Department of Health and Human Services.</p> <p>Funding Amount: Appropriates \$200 million (\$50 million for each of fiscal years 2010 through 2013).</p> <p>Application Process: Submit an application at such time, in such manner, and containing such information as the Secretary of Health and Human Services may require, including at a minimum, an assurance that funds awarded under the grant will not be used to provide any service that is not authorized or allowed under federal, state, or local law.</p>

4101(b)	<p>Program: Grants for the Operation of School-Based Health Centers</p> <p>Description: Grants to cover the costs of the operation of school-based health centers that provide, at a minimum, comprehensive primary health services during school hours to children and adolescents by health professionals in accordance with standards, community practice, reporting laws, and other state laws and does not perform abortion services. Funds may be used for: acquiring and leasing equipment, providing training related to the provision of primary health services; management and operation of health center programs; and the payment of salaries for health care professionals and personnel.</p> <p>Eligibility: School-based health center, meaning a clinic that is located in or near a school facility of a school district or board or of an Indian tribe or tribal organization; is organized through school, community, and health provider relationships; is administered by a sponsoring facility; provides through health professionals primary health services to children in accordance with state and local law, including laws relating to licensure and certification; and satisfies such other requirements as a state may establish for the operation of such a clinic. The school-based health center must be administered by a sponsoring facility, which may be any of the following: a hospital; a public health department; a community health center; a nonprofit health care agency; a school or school system; a program administered by the Indian Health Service or the Bureau of Indian Affairs or operated by an Indian tribe or a tribal organization.</p> <p>Funding Source: Department of Health and Human Services.</p> <p>Funding Amount: There is authorized to be appropriated such sums as may be necessary for each of the fiscal years 2010 through 2014. Participating entities must also provide matching funds.</p> <p>Application Process: Submit an application at such time and in such manner, containing certain specified evidence and assurances as well as any other information as the Secretary of Health and Human Services may require.</p> <p>Statutory Reference: Part Q of Title III of the Public Health Service Act (42 U.S.C. § 280h et seq.).</p>
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4102(a)	<p>Program: Oral Healthcare Prevention Activities; Research-Based Dental Caries Disease Management</p> <p>Description: Demonstration grants to demonstrate the effectiveness of research-based dental caries management activities.</p> <p>Eligibility: Community-based provider of dental services, including a federally-qualified health center, a clinic of a hospital owned or operated by a state (or an instrumentality or unit of government within a state), a state or local department of health, a dental program of the Indian Health Service, an Indian tribe or tribal organization, or an urban Indian organization, a health system provider, a private provider of dental services, medical, dental, public health, nursing, nutrition, educational institutions, or national organizations involved in improving children’s oral health.</p> <p>Funding Source: Centers for Disease Control and Prevention of the Department of Health and Human Services.</p> <p>Funding Amount: There is authorized the appropriation of such sums as may be necessary.</p> <p>Application Process: Submit an application at such time, in such manner, and containing such information as the Secretary of Health and Human Services may require.</p> <p>Statutory Reference: Title III of the Public Health Service Act (42 U.S.C. § 241 et seq.).</p>
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Section of PPACA	Title IV, Subtitle C Creating Healthier Communities
4201	<p>Program: Community Transformation Grants</p> <p>Description: Grants for the implementation, evaluation, and dissemination of evidence-based community preventive health activities in order to reduce chronic disease rates, prevent the development of secondary conditions, address health disparities, and develop a stronger evidence base of effective prevention programming. Not less than 20 percent of grants are to be awarded to rural and frontier areas.</p> <p>Eligibility: State government agency, local government agency, national network of community-based organizations, a state or local nonprofit organization, or an Indian tribe. Must also demonstrate a history or capacity to develop relationships to engage key stakeholders from multiple sectors within and beyond health care and across a community, such as healthy futures corps and health care providers.</p> <p>Funding Source: Centers for Disease Control and Prevention of the Department of Health and Human Services.</p> <p>Funding Amount: Appropriates such sums as may be necessary for fiscal years 2010 through 2014.</p> <p>Application Process: Submit an application at such time, in such a manner, and containing such information as the Director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention may require, including a description of the program to be carried out under the grant.</p>
